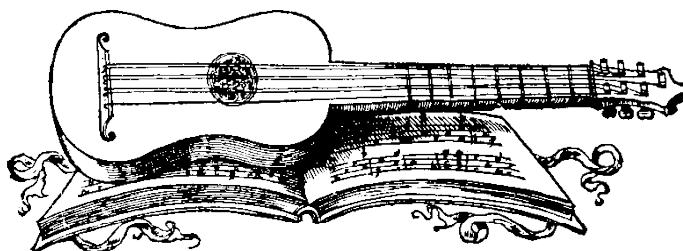

Alexander Technique workshop with John Edwards

Are you sitting on your 'Seat Bones' comfortably? Then I'll begin. Seven members assembled in a semi-circle in rooms 2 & 3 on 29th June for a session with **John Edwards** on the Alexander Technique. John started by giving us a little bit of history relating to the principles and benefits of the technique and also on F.M. Alexander himself.

Frederick Matthias Alexander (1869 – 1955) was a successful Australian actor/orator until he began to experience problems with his throat, which led to him losing his voice whilst reciting. Doctors were unable to help him so he decided to try to discover for himself what went wrong during performances. Over a period of many months, with the use of mirrors he observed that as soon as he started to recite, his neck stiffened, which led him to pull his head back and down. This in turn led to narrowing and shortening his back. He worked persistently on a method to overcome his problems and it took him over 9 years to develop and perfect his technique.

The Alexander Technique teaches people to use themselves more effectively. Mind and body constantly interact, the mind takes on ideas and

the body will follow. John taught us to become aware of the co-ordination between the head, neck and back by gently guiding us in and out of a chair to experience using our bodies more effectively.

Now seat bones are really the name of the game. You need to be able to feel them on your chair to keep your pelvis upright and allow gravity to support the whole body. Alternatively people tend to sit on the sacral area of the spine, reducing space and shortening the back. We did some work with our guitars to make us more aware of how we sit, reducing any twists in the shoulders and back.

We also did some work (now work is a very funny word to use in this context, as it was very relaxing indeed and most of us just wanted to fall asleep) lying on the floor in a semi-supine position. Now you are supposed to be awake for this and be aware of which parts of the body are in contact with the floor. The aim being to realign and lengthen the spine and reduce muscular tension. We were told to do this every day, a good opportunity to listen to music. Can't think of a better excuse! If you would like a follow up workshop then please let me know.

'Treasurer's Corner'

As you know we will be holding the **AGM** at the start of the July meeting. At the meeting you will get a copy of the audited accounts for 2007-08. Based on overall satisfactory state of the society funds, I will be recommending that we keep the annual subscriptions for next year at the same level as last year. You, of course, have the final say with your vote at the meeting. As a registered charity, we try and take full advantage of the Gift Aid system whereby we can claim back tax paid on your personal subscription. Of course not everybody is a tax payer, but at present the tax we get back from those of you who do, (and who have signed up to the Gift Aid system) is the equivalent of having 5 extra members in the society. So it's well worth my time and efforts to encourage all taxpaying members to sign up. It's very simple - I give you a form to complete, which takes all of two minutes, and I then submit an annual claim. It costs individuals nothing, the money we get back comes out of what you have already paid to the government. So if you are a tax payer and would like to sign up to the Gift Aid scheme, please let me know and I'll arrange it. It is just worth mentioning the corollary; to keep me out of trouble, anyone who ceases to be a tax payer should please let me know, as I must stop claiming the Gift Aid rebate on your subscription.

The tea and coffee breaks that we all enjoy at our monthly meetings are run on a self financing basis. We ask for a contribution of 30p to cover the costs of purchasing the basic ingredients. Over recent months the fund hasn't quite been able to make ends meet! At future meetings, when you collect tea, coffee or biscuits, could you all please look for the little brown plastic container and drop your 30p in it. Thanks in advance!

The Lost Art of Wooing and The Lady's Answer

Saturday 17th May at St.Tudy's Church Bodmin, Cornwall.

Before setting off for a week's holiday in Cornwall, I checked my emails to discover that there was a concert that very evening possibly not too far from where we would be staying. We decided that we would wait until we arrived and then consult our newly acquired 'Tom Tom' as to how long it would take us.

Well, Tom Tom estimated 33 minutes, so that was that and off we went. Now although Tom did know the way, he seemed to prefer very narrow roads with few passing places, and as a consequence I am now quite adept at driving backwards! 
also introduced the songs, enlightening the audience of the art of wooing, flirting, serenading and paying compliments from a time gone by.

The second half titled '**The Lady's Answer**', was a collection of 17th century women's poems recently set to music by **Brian Wright**. These were also sung by Jeni but accompanied this time by Brian himself. This was an interesting idea as not many women wrote songs in those days but apparently they did write quite a bit of poetry. The chosen ones were written by Mary Wroth, Katherine Philips and Elizabeth I and worked beautifully set to music.
